St. Francis and the Wolf

Narrator: In a town in Italy called Gubbio, the citizens were scared of a fierce wolf. It was so hungry that it started killing farm animals and then started attacking the people. They were so afraid of the wolf that they wouldn't even go out of their houses at night.

When they saw the gentle monk approaching the village, they ran out crying:

All: Please help us, the wolf wants to eat us all.

Saint Francis: I will go and speak to this wolf.

All: Aren't you afraid?

St Francis: A little, but we are all God's children.

Narrator: That night as the townsfolk watched from the safety of the city wall, Francis ventured beyond the gates and into the surrounding forest. Almost immediately the wolf came charging out of the forest, its teeth bared.

Wolf: GRRRRRRRR

St. Francis: Peace brother wolf, I know you are hungry but you cannot terrorize these poor people... we are all God's children.

Narrator: At this, the wolf stopped in its tracks and closed its mouth. Invited to come closer, the wolf approached Francis and lay down at his feet and howled gently.

Wolf: Woor, woor

Narrator: Francis convinced the people to feed the wolf every day. In exchange, the wolf would never hurt anyone.

From that day forward, the wolf appeared in town every afternoon, stopping at a different house to be fed. The wolf was gentle and the humans courteous.

All: Here dear wolf, come get your lunch.

Wolf: Woor, woor, woor

Narrator: When the wolf finally died of old age, the people of Gubbio grieved. But thanks to the love and concern of St. Francis they learned to try and live in peace with nature and one another... something we can do in our own way every day.
